I would love to share with you all our new BTHCC motto which grew from Father Roberts sermon at our first Mass back in September.

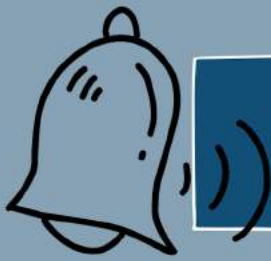

## OUR NEW YEAR 7'S

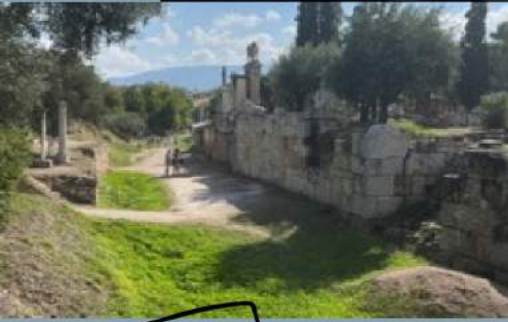

## BLACK HISTORY MONTH

In the month of October we have been marking Black History month. It gives everyone the opportunity to share, celebrate and understand the impact of black heritage and culture. This year's theme is 'Before Windrush' - an exploration of the lives and stories of the Black Britons who were living in the UK before the arrival of the Empire Windrush in 1948. Although we celebrate equality and diversity throughout the year, we have been focussing on our pupils developing their cultural knowledge even more during October. We are extremely proud that our school library has a large array of texts that all our pupils can recognise themselves in. Here are just a few texts that you can borrow from our library.



We have once again focused on the black historians of the future, two brand new diversity displays and with presentations up in the hall for the past three weeks, featuring over 35 different personalities of black or Afro-Caribbean origin in a wide range of fields such as music, science, mathematics, politics and activism, poetry, history, economics, and academia as well as sport and entertainment.



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Vincent is a Belgian professional football manager and former player who is currently manager of Premier League Club Burnley. He played for Manchester City for 11 seasons, and was captain for 8 of these.



### Vincent Kompany

Vincent also represented the Belgian national team for 15 years, 7 as captain.

### Sir Arthur Lewis

When he joined the University of Manchester in 1948, Arthur Lewis became Britain's first black professor. He went on to complete most his important work there and in 1979 was awarded the Nobel Prize in Economic Sciences. A building at the University has been named in his honour.



But this wasn't all that Claudia did. After fighting injustice in the UK, where some black people were even attacked, Claudia wanted a way for black Britons to celebrate and support each other. She decided to bring a Caribbean carnival to London! The carnival was a grand event held in St Pancras Town Hall filled with music and dancing. This event eventually became the Notting Hill Carnival!



### Claudia Jones

Activist/Organiser

Claudia Jones was born in Trinidad. She spent her early life in America where she was a journalist. She wrote about the unfair treatment of black women that she saw and experienced.

In 1955 she came to live in London. She was shocked to discover that finding a place to live was hard if you were black. There were no laws then to protect people from being treated unequally because of the colour of their skin.



### Katherine Jenkins

Mathematician, physicist

Long before computers – or even calculators, Katherine was an American mathematician whose calculations of orbital mechanics in the early 1960s as a NASA employee were critical to the success of the first and subsequent U.S. crewed spaceflights.



### Muyiwa Oki

Architect

Muyiwa Oki is an architect at construction consultancy, Mace Group. Throughout his career, he has worked on large-scale infrastructure projects, such as HS2 Euston and the North London heat and power project.

Muyiwa is an external speaker and mentor for aspiring architects in programmes to encourage greater social mobility within the industry.

Muyiwa has been elected to be the next President of the Royal Institute of British Architects.



### Learie Constantine

Cricketer/Member of the House of Lords

Learie was born in Trinidad in 1901. He was brilliant at cricket. He helped to win big games and important awards in Trinidad and on trips to England. After playing in a big charity cricket match in London, Learie and his family were turned away from a hotel. They were refused the room based only on the colour of their skin.

He knew this was unfair and that he must do something about it. He took the hotel to court to prove that they had treated him and his family unfairly. And he won!

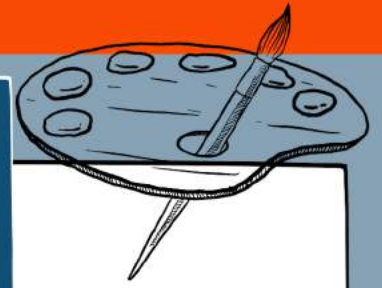

## ATTENDANCE MATTERS

Welcome back to all our BTHCC family, parents, carers and pupils, and a big fat welcome to our new year 7 cohort and their parents and carers.

Just to keep you all updated, we have made an excellent start to the year regarding our school attendance, we need to keep our finger on the pulse and keep supporting our pupils to attend school every day on time.

We all know students who attend school regularly have been shown to achieve at higher levels than students who do not have a regular attendance.

Just to put attendance into perspective for this early, in the year if a pupil has had:

1 days absence their attendance will be 96.15%

2 days absence their attendance will be 92.31%

3 days absence their attendance will be 88.46%

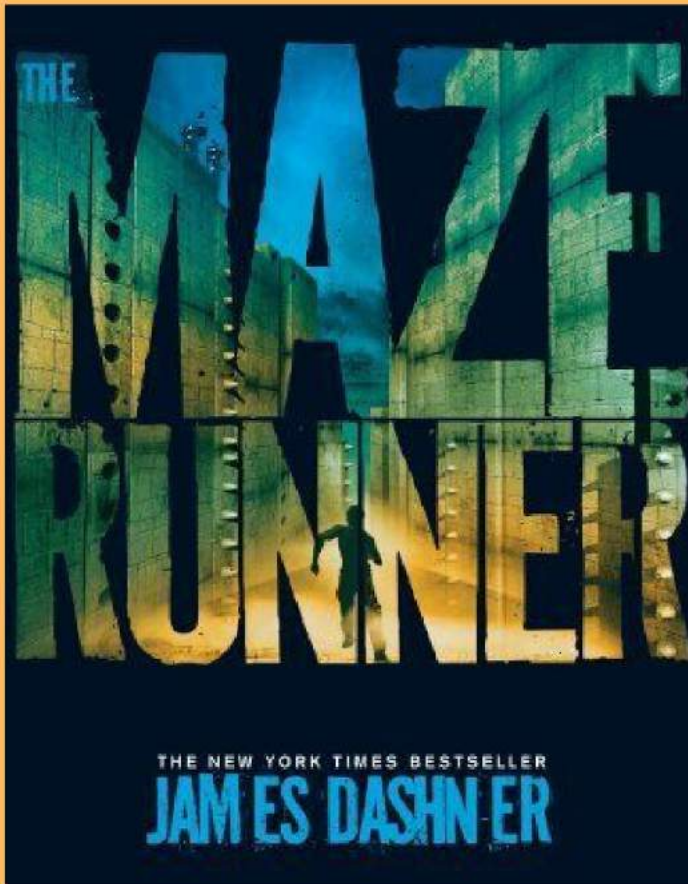
Our aim is for all our pupils to have an attendance score of **96%** and above.
