I would like to share with you all our new BTHCC motto which grew from Father Roberts sermon at our first Mass back in September.


May God's love be our guide


GLOBAL STUDENTS

If you think your child might be interested, ask them to come along to our meetings which take place fortnightly, with the next one being on Thursday 9th November.





OLDFIELD BANK RESIDENTIAL










What a blessing it is to be able to spend time with the residents at Oldfield Bank residential home in Bowdon.





CONSERVATIVE PARTY






This is our exciting new book vending machine. Our aim as a school is to get more children reading!!

Just to keep you all updated, we have made an excellent start to the year regarding our school attendance, we need to keep our finger on the pulse and keep supporting our students to attend school every day on time.

We all know students who attend school regularly have been shown to achieve at higher levels than students who do not have a regular attendance.

Just to put attendance into perspective for this early, in the year if a pupil has had:

1 days absence their attendance will be 96.15%

2 days absence their attendance will be 92.31%

3 days absence their attendance will be 88.46%


Our aim is for all our students to have an attendance score of **96%** and above.

Bringing you the answers to the questions we want to know about our teachers asked directly by the students themselves.



Mrs Butterworth

1. What is one of your hidden talents?

I don't know if I really have any hidden talents! I do love a sing song on karaoke and I don't get booed so I will go with singing...I think I sound good in the car but my children may disagree!

2. What is your favourite dish from the school cafeteria?

A tuna and cheese jacket potato. I used to love the parsnips...on their own with some gravy but they have seemed to disappear from the menu. Maybe I could start a petition to BRING BACK THE PARSNIPS.

3. What are your "trapped on a desert island" books?

There are A LOT so I will try and whittle them down. I love Where the Crawdads Sing, I read it about two years ago and it beautifully written with a great plot twist so I would definitely pack that. I also borrowed a book from Jorja in Year 11 last year 'The Seven Husbands of Evelyn Hugo' and really enjoyed that too so I recommended it to the staff and quite a few people read it and felt the same...a great read. Finally, I would take a selection of Stephen King books: Carrie, Misery, Dolores Clairborne, The Institute. Stephen King was my go to read as a teenager and as I have got a bit older (21 now) I have started to re-read them again and I am enjoying them just as much the second time round.

4. How does technology make teaching more simple or difficult?

Oooo good question. I think sometimes technology over complicates things and I would definitely say that children rely more heavily on technology which has had an impact on technical accuracy of writing and expression...but that is just the English teacher in me.

5. What would the students be surprised to find out about you?

I was born and raised in North Wales and moved to Sale 18 years ago to begin my teaching career at BTHCC. I can still speak a bit of Welsh...well tipyn bach (a little bit).

6. What inspires you?

I am not sure really. I love teaching English, I have recently started teaching Year 7 and I adore it as I usually tend to teach the older students but in terms of inspiration...I just want to be a great teacher and for students to enjoy their lessons.

7. Are there any embarrassing teaching moments you are willing to share? What are they?

Yes...I was teaching Year 11 a few years ago and literally fell into a box that was next to the board. It was hilarious but incredibly embarrassing!!



Who is Ms Hogg?

We've all noticed a new face around school, and that face is none other than the one and only Mrs Hogg!

Since she's here for the long haul, here at the BTHCC Newsletter, we thought it would be the perfect time to interview our lovely new head on the plans for our school and how she came to be here!

Why did you choose BTHCC as your next big adventure?

"I was at Saint Thomas More Catholic High School for nine years, and everything was going well, and I was having a really lovely time! However, Blessed Thomas Holford had always been a school I wanted to know more about. It was like a beacon of education, always on the move with exciting things happening. So when I saw the headship position open up, I thought, 'I'll come and take a look.' I visited, and it was just such an exciting place to be. The students were engaged, and the conversations I had with the teachers were phenomenal. I thought, 'This looks like a great place,' and then I considered it my next adventure. My previous school was quite small, with around 650 students, so moving to a school with 1600 students was a big jump! But I wanted to be part of this beacon. When you drive up the road, you can see BTHCC from miles away with its lovely colours! Shining bright. It is like the people in the BTHCC family.

Do you think your experience has prepared you to face the behavioural problems in our school?

I believe that dealing with behaviour, especially in the context of COVID-19, is a significant challenge. Young people have experienced a traumatic time during the pandemic, which is something I never had to face when I was your age. I vividly remember the day when we were informed that schools would be closing due to the pandemic. I even had the emotional experience of locking up my school for the last time. I walked home with tears in my eyes, not just because of the uncertainty, but also because I knew that my Year 11 students wouldn't have the opportunity for a prom, and they were stressed about their exams. It was a sad moment because school serves as a home and a safe place for many children, providing structure and support.

I strongly believe in the power of role modelling. To address behaviour, we must ensure that the adults in the school are modelling the behaviour we expect from students. For instance, if a student replies with a simple "yes" when speaking to me, I would wait for them to say "Yes, Miss" because it's a matter of politeness. On the other hand I would always greet students and hold open doors for them. I would explain the importance of such gestures as acts of kindness. It's about having these conversations and establishing a culture of caring for one another, looking out for each other, and fostering a sense of responsibility.

Do you think the school adequately supports students with Special Educational Needs (SEN)?

This is an area which we should always be improving and researching. For instance, PowerPoints should be in SEN-friendly fonts, and the colours should be suitable for students with specific needs. White text on a black background, for example, might not be ideal for some students. There are students who require specific colors or overlays, and it's crucial that everything is accessible to everyone. We need to ensure that there are no barriers to learning.

Everything should be designed to accommodate every student's needs, whether it's an SEN need, a behavioral need, or an engagement need.

It ultimately comes down to the teacher's role in planning and delivering a lesson to ensure everyone can access it. I've personally noticed how vital this is, as my eyesight is deteriorating, and I always need my glasses. Forgetting them and being asked to read something can be quite stressful, and it has made me more aware of what it might be like in a classroom. Therefore, it's essential to focus on the student experience and listen to their needs because they are the ones experiencing it. I can teach a lesson for an hour and think it's fantastic, but if you've been bored and haven't learned anything, it's not a great lesson. We need to address this.

I believe that when it comes to SEN, you can never achieve a perfect 100% because there's always more to learn and adapt to, given the ever-evolving needs of students. It's about remaining open to new perspectives and continually improving."

What is the one book you think everyone, especially young people, should read at least once in their life?

There are so many books, but I am a huge Jane Austen fan. Last year, I took my school to the Jane Austen festival in Bath and we all dressed up as Jane Austen characters. It was phenomenal. I'm a huge fan of 'Pride and Prejudice,' but the book that I remember most is from when I was in year six. A teacher read 'Jane Eyre' to us, the Charlotte Bronte book. I always remember sitting in that classroom and listening to the teacher tell the story of 'Jane Eyre.' So I love Jane Austen abd the Brontes, but there are so many beautiful books out there. I just love reading. For young people today, there are books that can help them with everyday situations, dealing with various issues. I'm quite romantic, so I love 'Jane Eyre,' 'Pride and Prejudice,' and 'Sense and Sensibility.' That's my romantic side. But there are plenty of contemporary books that are quite impactful and relevant to today's world, tackling hard-hitting issues. I love autobiographies such as Michelle Obama. I can't wait for the children to discover the books in 'Brenda the Vendor.' It's going to be great.

Do you think that academic success, in the sense of GCSE results, is an honest reflection of a student's intelligence and future potential?

No, I'll tell you why. I didn't perform exceptionally well in my GCSEs, and my A-levels were not outstanding either. I always managed to scrape by with what I needed to progress to the next stage. However, the way I was brought up emphasised other qualities. I was encouraged to read, engage in experiences, and communicate with people. We were never allowed to say we were bored; we were encouraged to stay active and explore the world around us. I believe that learning how to interact with others, project your voice effectively, and stay engaged is a valuable life skill. Sometimes, individuals may possess numerous qualifications but not make the most of them, while others with fewer qualifications continue to grow and thrive. Personally, I've found that my passion for learning has led to better academic performance later in life than when I was your age. This shift occurred because I pursued my dream of becoming a teacher. If you're the type of person who seizes every opportunity, such as contributing to a newspaper or joining a team or a debate, you can achieve great things. It's about having the mindset that welcomes challenges and new experiences, which can be just as important as achieving top grades across the board. Does that make sense to you? I hope it does!

Make sure to try and say hi to Mrs Hogg in the coming term, and here's to the College Newsletter, we cant wait to see what she's going to do our school!
